

Dedication

As we finished the school year '65-'66, and looked toward the years to come, we were realizing the sunrise of a dream. Our own Bishop Byrne High School is the result of years of careful planning and painstaking work. Our debt as the students of Bishop Byrne is to many people: the contractors and builders; our faculty; our school administration; Father Cleary, who has been termed the "grand-daddy" of Bishop Byrne High School; Father Cashin, our principal; and Bishop Durick, who dedicated our wondrous building.

Ultimately, however, we owe much to the loving efforts of one man, Bishop William L. Adrian. As chief administrator of the diocese his backing convinced others of the need for a co-educational high school in this area. With his help the ideal site was chosen. No problem was too small, no detail too trivial to merit his attention, for, like a true father, he wished that this venture reflect well on all people concerned.

We who have spent a full school year at Bishop Byrne realize perhaps better than any others the magnitude of the gift presented us through Bishop Adrian. Our school is indeed a showplace. It boasts many "firsts" possible for us only through the foresight of this man. It was his wish to spare no expense in order to bring the young people of South Shelby County the finest in faculty, school equipment, and other vital necessities for the smooth running of a good school.

But these are only tangible things, which evidence a mere material interest in Bishop Byrne High School. It is the idea behind this interest, the motive shown by this undertaking for which we are so grateful to Bishop Adrian. This school is a manifestation of his vital interest in youth and the deep faith he has in it. It is for this that we dedicate to Bishop Adrian our first SHIELD.



FATHER CASHIN

The man who sits behind the principal's desk at Bishop Byrne High School holds a position which is unique indeed. There are few projects at the school in which Father Cashin has not had a hand. 

This responsibility alone seemed enough to consume much of her time, but in addition Sister Terence accepted positions as head of the BBHS guidance department, home economics instructor and senior English teacher. 


Consideration — a faculty watchword

JUNIOR CLASS



Moderator of the class was Miss Sylvia Viglietti.








NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY


Time passed and permission to have a year-book was granted. More time passed and the name was chosen. Still more time passed and the staff was elected.



Varsity has near perfect record




This Red Knight heads for six on the football field behind Bishop Byrne.



On the last day of retreat a Bible service was held, something new and different to all the students. The ceremony consisted of incensing the Bible and reading several passages from the New Testament.



These "Shelbyettes", previous winners in the Mid-South Fair Contest, furnished entertainment during those "fill-in spots".



The many zany predicaments are final ly resolved in a novel climax. The angels return to their home, leaving the world somewhat happier for their visit "Down to Earth".
